(a) 781.

(b) The supplying of rations was discontinued for various reasons such as a person qualifies for pension under one of the statutory pension schemes; is placed in employment or leaves the area, etc.

(c) The supplying of rations was not discontinued for a special period. If a person whose supply of rations was stopped for reasons mentioned above, should again apply for rations and it is found that he is entitled thereto, rations will be issued again.

- (3) (a) and (b) The rations are not determined in relation to monetary value. A supplementary ration scale was determined in 1972 after consultation with the Republican Department of Health and this scale is followed with such adjustments as local circumstances may require. The ration scale complies with world health organization standards.

Transkei: a technical college section at the existing technical school at Umtata has been approved.

Technical schools are planned by the following homeland governments: Bophutatswana, Lebowa, Gazankulu, Venda and Basotho-Qwaqwa.

There are already two technical schools in kwaZulu, namely, Edendale and Umlazi.

Bantu education: Shortage of schools, teachers, etc.

99. Mr. L. F. WOOD asked the Minister of Bantu Education:

- (1) What is the present estimated or actual shortage of (a) schools, (b) classrooms, (c) White and Bantu teachers, respectively, and (d) White and Bantu lecturers, respectively, in (i) urban, (ii) rural and (iii) homeland areas of the Republic;

- (2) what is the earliest date at which it is expected that these shortages will be overcome.

The MINISTER OF BANTU EDUCATION:

The reply to this question is basically the same as the reply which I furnished on 26 March 1971, viz.:

- (1) It is unfortunately not possible to make a reliable estimation of the shortage of schools, classrooms and Bantu teachers. There is no shortage of White teachers and White and Bantu lecturers. It is policy, however, that the posts which are presently occupied by Whites should gradually be filled by competent Bantu.
- (2) It is also not possible to furnish a date at which it is expected that any shortages will be overcome. My Department of Bantu Education is doing its best to provide the necessary services.

Bantu teachers: Salaries

111. Mr. L. F. WOOD asked the Minister of Bantu Education:

Whether the salaries of Bantu teachers are to be adjusted on the basis of the same ratio as that which applies at Bantu universities; if so, when; if not, why not.

The MINISTER OF BANTU EDUCATION:

No. Salary adjustments are made from time to time either on an *ad hoc* basis for certain groups or in general according to needs and with due regard to the availability of funds and the effect which such adjustments would have on the remuneration pattern of the public sector as a whole.

Social pensions: Agreement with British Government

- (2) The wards for mentally deficient patients in mental hospitals have

been closed down and the practice of keeping mentally deficient patients in mental hospitals has been discontinued.

(3) The shortage of accommodation at Government institutions will be relieved by the following:

- (i) An additional 260 beds at Umgeni Waterfall Institution, Howick, will become available in February 1977.
 - (ii) Rebuilding and extensions to Witrand Institution, Potchefstroom, is going to tender in June 1974.
 - (iii) The building of a new institution for mentally deficient White patients in Bloemfontein has reached an advanced stage of planning.
 - (iv) The building of an institution for Coloureds in the Western Cape has also reached an advanced stage of planning.
 - (v) Additional accommodation is to be provided for 330 patients at Brooklyn Chest Hospital during 1974-'75.
- (4) The Department has revised its regulations to continue payment of maintenance grants during the absence of an inmate for a period of 42 days.
 - (5) The grant for day centres has been increased to R2 per patient per school-day and is currently paid by my Department.

- (iii) Par. 205(5): One post of Professional Officer (Welfare) has already been created at one of the three institutions concerned.

The creation of similar posts at the other institutions will be considered in due course. In the interim satisfactory arrangements have been made for utilizing the services of staff attached to nearby institutions.

- (iv) Par. 208(3): See reply relating to par. 205(5). The recommendation is being implemented.
- (v) Par. 211: The promotion of the welfare of handicapped adults for which my Department is responsible is receiving special attention by a section in the Department's Head Office known as the Section for the Care of the Aged and the Handicapped.
- (vi) Par. 217(2): Special subsidies are being paid to encourage the appointment of suitably qualified personnel.
- (vii) Par. 221: Full particulars of the loan facilities available for the erection of institutions and protected workshops and of the subsidies payable in respect of the institutional care of the handicapped and in respect of protected workshops are set out in my Department's Circular No. 23 of 1971 which has *inter alia*, been issued to welfare bodies concerned with the care of the handicapped.

Mr. W. T. WEBBER: Mr. Speaker, arising out of the hon. the Minister's reply, will he tell us whether the Government is considering reducing the price of table butter and household butter to the housewife in the same way as he has offered butter at a lower price to industrialists?

The MINISTER: Mr. Speaker, we have considered the idea but simply by reducing the price per 500 g by 10c will cost the Government R500 000 per month. The butter we are offering to industries is old butter. We cannot offer this kind of butter to housewives.

Mr. W. T. WEBBER: Mr. Speaker, arising out of the further reply of the hon. the Minister, will he tell us whether the board or his Department has investigated a new process known as UHT, or ultra high temperature pasteurization, whether this process can be applied to butter and whether they are in fact applying it thereto?

The MINISTER: As far as I know, Mr. Speaker, the high temperature pasteurization method is only applied to fresh milk and not to butter. I am not sure, but I think we are applying it on milk but not to butter.

Mr. W. T. WEBBER: Arising further, Mr. Speaker, from the Minister's reply,

will the hon. the Minister give this House an undertaking that he will investigate this process further and ascertain whether in fact it can be used for butter?

The MINISTER: We have investigated everything.

Mr. W. T. WEBBER: Arising further out of the reply of the hon. the Minister, will he tell this House why the subsidy on butter for the present year is less than the subsidy that was made available last year?

The MINISTER: There was a lower consumption. If the consumption is lower then, naturally, the subsidy is lower.

Mr. W. T. WEBBER: Arising further out of the reply of the hon. the Minister, will he tell us why he is not prepared to spend as much on subsidizing butter this year as last year?

Mr. SPEAKER: Order!

†Mr. D. M. STREICHER: Mr. Speaker, arising from the reply of the hon. the Minister, may I ask him what he is going to do with the surplus butter? Is there any possibility that they may destroy it?

†The MINISTER: Mr. Speaker, several investigations are taking place at the moment. The whole problem is one in connection with yellow margarine. Due to the shortage of oils an attempt is being made to negotiate with these people to see if some of this butter can be used in the manufacturing process of margarine and to persuade industries to use more of the older butter. We are also considering obtaining the approval of the Minister of Finance to use part of this subsidy to close butter factories and to encourage farmers to produce industrial milk instead. This is a fairly complicated problem; I do not think that a member of the United Party will easily understand it. We are looking at all the aspects in this connection.

Mr. W. G. KINGWILL: Arising out of the hon. the Minister's reply to the first question, I would like to know if the Minister is aware that there is a very serious shortage of oil seed in the country and that we may run into an oil seed shortage in the near future?

The MINISTER: Sir, at the moment the margarine people are importing. We realize

that there is a shortage. Our farmers are getting R170 per ton for ground nuts and the price in the world market is R400 per ton, because of the world shortage. We realize that there is a shortage, but has the hon. member got a solution?

Dr. E. L. FISHER: Arising out of the hon. the Minister's reply, will he tell us what he means by "old butter"?

The MINISTER: Old butter is rancid butter.

Mr. W. T. WEBER: Would the hon. the Minister explain the thinking which allows the country to import oils at a high price, for the making of yellow margarine. . . .

Mr SPEAKER: Order!

†Mr. H. van Z. CILLIÉ: Arising from the hon. the Minister's reply, may I ask him whether the surplus butter which is not used by the industrialists will be destroyed, just as the bananas will be?

†An hon. MEMBER: You are destroyed.

†Mr. SPEAKER: Order!

Elderly/Infirm Bantu: Settlements/Homes

78. Mr. G. N. OLDFIELD asked the Minister of Bantu Administration and Development:

- (1) How many (a) settlements and (b) registered homes are there for elderly and/or infirm Bantu which are administered by (i) churches and, missions, (ii) registered welfare organizations and (iii) Bantu governments or authorities;
- (2) what is the total number of Bantu persons who can be accommodated in these settlements and homes;
- (3) whether there are any homes for aged Bantu in White areas; if so, (a) where are they situated and (b) how many Bantu persons can they accommodate.

The MINISTER OF BANTU ADMINISTRATION AND DEVELOPMENT:

The Aged Persons Act, 1967, provides for two types of homes namely Homes

for the Aged and registered Homes For the Aged. No provision is made for settlements. In practise the term "Home for Chronic Physically Incapacitated Aged and Others", was used when a registered home for the aged was intended while the term "Settlement for the Physically Able Aged", was used when a home for the aged run by the State or registered home for the aged run by a private person or organization was intended.

A reply on the basis of the terminology used in the question could be confusing and the reply hereunder includes all types of homes and facilities.

- (1) (a) and (b) There are no homes registered in terms of the Aged Persons Act, 1967, managed by Churches, Missions and registered Welfare Organizations in the Bantu Homelands and all the powers, duties and functions under the Aged Persons Act, 1967, now vest in the Homeland Governments so that they are not required to register. On the said basis the reply on information furnished by the Homeland Governments concerned is as follows:
