In addition, water is very scarce and they have to see to that too.

S.A.A. flights delayed at Luanda

The DEPUTY MINISTER OF TRANSPORT replied to Question *20, by Mr. E. G. Malan.

- (1) Whether a flight of the South African Airways has since 1 November 1972 been delayed at Luanda for more than five hours; if so, (a) on what date, (b) what was the type of aircraft, (c) for how long and (d) what were the reasons for the delay;
- (2) whether hotel accommodation was arranged for the passengers; if so, what were the arrangements; if not, where did the passengers have to (a) stay and (b) sleep;
- (3) (a) what was the approximate size of the place where they had to stay and (b) what arrangements were made in connection with food;
- (4) whether the passengers were allowed to visit Luanda; if not, why not;
- (5) whether there were (a) South African and (b) other technicians at the airport who had been trained to inspect and repair an aircraft of this type; if so, how many in each case;
- (6) (a) What was the terminal point of the flight, (b) what was the delay in the arrival of the aircraft at the terminal point and (c) at what time did it arrive;
- (7) whether any hotel accommodation was arranged for the passengers after their arrival at the terminal point; if so, what accommodation; if not, why not;
- (8) whether any applications for compensation were received from passengers; if so, what are the details; if not,
- (9) whether he will consider any applications in this connection.

- (1) (a), (b), (c) and (d) Yes, flights were delayed on account of technical difficulties on the following dates:

On 30 November 1972 flight SA256 by Boeing 707, 7 hrs. 25 min.

On 15 December 1972 flight SA232 by Boeing 747, 8 hrs. 30 min.

On 30 September 1973 flight SA236 by Boeing 747, 8 hrs.

On 16 November 1973 flight SA250 by Boeing 707, 13 hrs. 30 min.

- (2) (a) and (b) In instances where the duration of the delay was known and hotel accommodation was justified and available and where local authorities were agreeable to passengers leaving the airport, such hotel accommodation was provided. In cases where passengers had to remain at the airport, they were accommodated in the transit lounge and slept in the aforementioned lounge and the aircraft.

Appropriate refreshments were served in all instances, while breakfast was also served on board flights SA236 and SA232 of 3 December and 22 December 1973, respectively, as normal airline practice.

- (4) Owing to either the prohibition by Angolan authorities or the uncertainty of the duration of the delays, city tours were arranged for the passengers on flights SA250 of 16 November and SA236 of 3 December 1973 only.

The DEPUTY MINISTER OF JUSTICE:

- (1) and (2) Four persons from Durban were trapped in a speed trap outside Beaufort West on 8 January 1974. None of these persons was summoned to appear in court on 11 February 1974. Because there was doubt whether the place where the alleged offences took place was a built-up area, the public prosecutor decided to withdraw the charges. Apparently the hon. member refers to the case of a certain J. du Plessis, of Pinetown, who was trapped in the speed trap concerned. The traffic department could not trace him to inform him of the withdrawal. On 7 February 1974 Mr. Du Plessis, apparently on his way home after holiday, had an interview with the public prosecutor and was then informed that the charge had been withdrawn.
- (3) All offenders have always had the right to approach attorneys-general to consider their particular circumstances. I am aware of the fact that some offenders of the regulations concerned approached attorneys-

general and that in deserving cases they were allowed to pay admission of guilt. To remove any doubt, however, attorneys-general towards the end of January and the beginning of February issued circulars in which prosecutors were empowered to fix admission of guilt in deserving cases, namely where long distances would have to be travelled. Doubtful cases will be referred to the attorneys-general.

It must be mentioned that the above-mentioned figures represent waiting lists kept by both the Department and local authorities and that duplication of waiting lists is general. It is an absolutely impossible task to arrive at a logical conclusion in connection with housing needs by merely taking the sum total of the waiting lists into account. Not only does a waiting list soon become obsolete but it has been my Department's experience over a long period of time that applicants usually have their names added to the Department's list as well as the lists of all the local authorities in the vicinity, which naturally brings about large scale duplication of applications.

Many also have their names added to lists at the same body, e.g. a local authority, for renting as well as for purchasing a dwelling. Many persons who are well housed but through financial or various other reasons require other or less expensive housing or who wish to reside in another vicinity, also place their names on waiting lists. As a rule, disqualified persons whose names also appear on waiting lists, are reasonably housed and it does not indicate that an immediate housing need exists in respect of them.

†The DEPUTY MINISTER OF BANTU ADMINISTRATION AND EDUCATION:

(a) No, not by my Department directly.

The Department did negotiate with different city councils via Bantu Af-

fairs Administration Boards but particulars are not available. Only in one particular instance the Chief Bantu Affairs Commissioner for the Western Cape and myself put a request to the City Council of Cape Town after informal negotiations with the town clerk, regarding amenities for Bantu in the Sea Point area.

- (b) Particulars in connection with results from negotiations between Bantu Affairs Administration boards and city councils are not fully available but generally good progress has been reported from time to time and eating facilities and other amenities have already been provided at various towns with the necessary co-operation of local authorities. The Administrators-in-Executive Committee of the different provinces have also made certain positive suggestions to city councils and other local authorities under their jurisdiction.

In the case of Cape Town the City Council and its officials also immediately implemented efforts to find suitable sites and to consider various alternatives. Unfortunately their efforts have been considerably jeopardised as a result of public representations and protests by individuals as well as representatives of certain political parties. These protests drew considerable attention in the Press which hampered the City Council's efforts.

During a meeting of the United Municipal Executive of Southern Africa in Cape Town on 12 February 1974 I had the opportunity to bring the views of my Department regarding this whole issue to the attention of representatives and I have full confidence that the necessary amenities will be provided throughout the country in such a manner as to satisfy the residents in general and at the same time provide for the needs of Bantu employees.

†Mr. J. M. HENNING: Mr. Speaker, arising from the reply given by the hon. the Deputy Minister, can he tell us what political parties complicated this issue?

†The DEPUTY MINISTER: I shall reply just briefly to this. I can only go by newspaper reports. The representations

which came to my attention via the newspapers, came from the Chairman of the Sea Point Branch of the Progressive Party.

Mr. L. G. MURRAY: Mr. Speaker, arising out of the hon. the Deputy Minister's reply to the main question, may I ask him whether the Government is prepared to leave the siting and establishment of these amenities to the local authority, to the discretion of the local authority?

†The DEPUTY MINISTER: Mr. Speaker, there are certain rules which control these matters in terms of Act No. 49 of 1953, as previously explained in this House by the hon. the Prime Minister. Regional towns for Coloureds of Natal

- (c) Ladysmith: After statutory requirements have been complied with, the report of the Group Areas Board will be submitted for my consideration.
- (d) Marburg: A Coloured group area was proclaimed on 23 November 1973.

(e) Pietermaritzburg: No further Coloured group area is contemplated at this stage.

(f) At present no further regional towns for Coloureds are envisaged in other centres in Natal. However, for the information of the hon. member it may be added that the possibility of proclaiming group areas for Coloureds at Dundee, Ixopo and Utrecht to satisfy local needs, is receiving attention.

In view of the objectiveness of the Department as well as the large local authorities to extend housing programmes for Coloureds and Indians in order that large shortages, where they occur may be wiped out in the foreseeable future, great pains were taken, notwithstanding the usual waiting lists which normally serve as a criterion but never reveal the true position, to obtain a more reliable assessment of requirements than has thus far been obtained. The information thus collected is indicated above.

The Department and local authorities are now prepared to erect during the next five years from ten to 12 thousand dwellings per annum for Coloureds in the Cape Province alone while the building programme for Indians in the Durban complex will also be raised to the maximum which can be handled.
