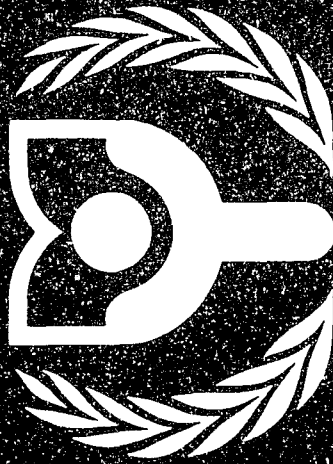

So, the proposed workshop for the 27th October 1992 has been designed to give you brief updates in the field, and to let you workshop with other professionals involved in the same line of work.

PROGRAMME OVERVIEW

It seems possible that ABE practitioners could come to an enhanced understanding of their own roles by working on questions such as:

- Who are we?
- What are we good at?
- What do we feel about the present situation in ABE?
- Where do we stand in relation to the policy-thinking which is happening in Adult Education?
- How can we empower ourselves, and become more of a force to be reckoned with?
- How can we improve the networks which could bring us closer together?

All in all, the workshop is seen as a day in which professionals in the ABE field can get together to examine their current situation critically and creatively. People will spend a large part of the day networking in groups. Facilitators will be on hand to help the group-discussion along. It is envisaged that a paper will emerge from the day's discussions, which will consolidate practitioners' needs, concerns and visions for the future.



WHO SHOULD ATTEND

The invitation to join in the workshop is extended to all practitioners working in the field of ABE/literacy. It certainly is not necessary to have been at the previous IPM one day seminar in order to participate fully in the proceedings of the workshop. It is hoped that people from as wide a range of organisations and institutions as possible will participate so that we can find common ground among ourselves to strengthen the position of Adult Basic Education in the larger educational, economic and political framework.

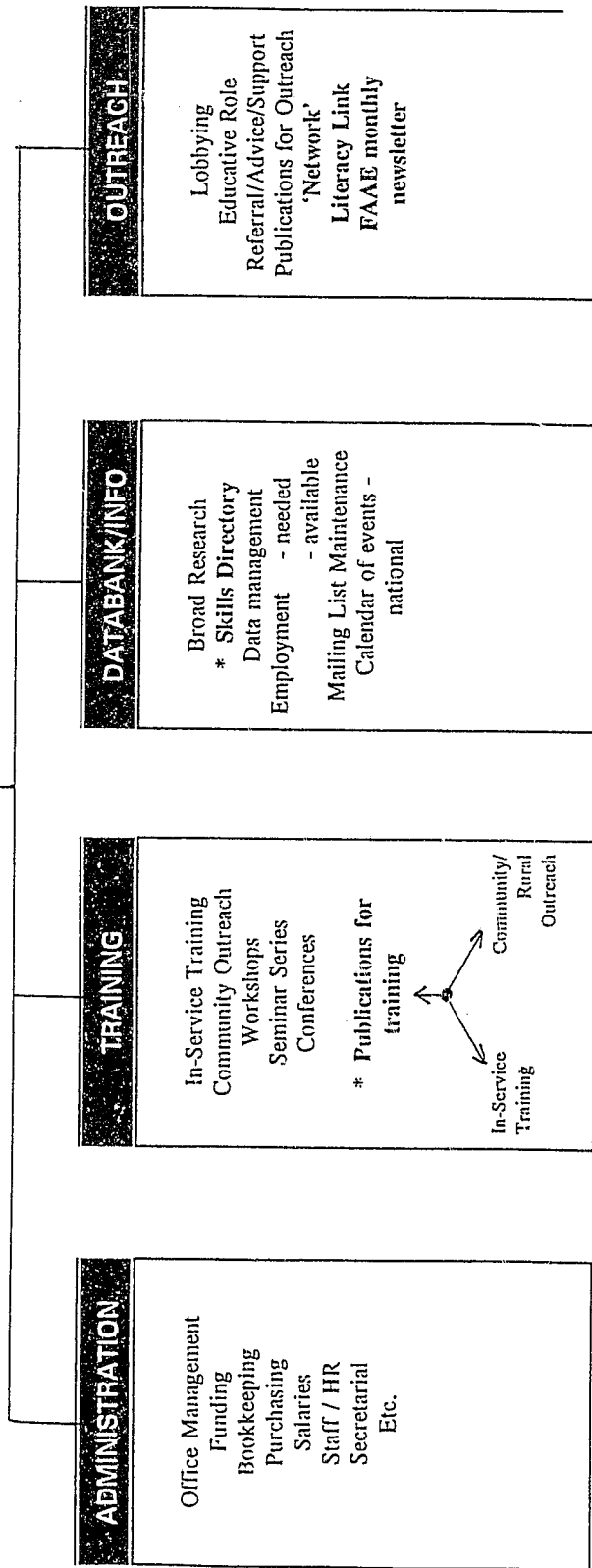

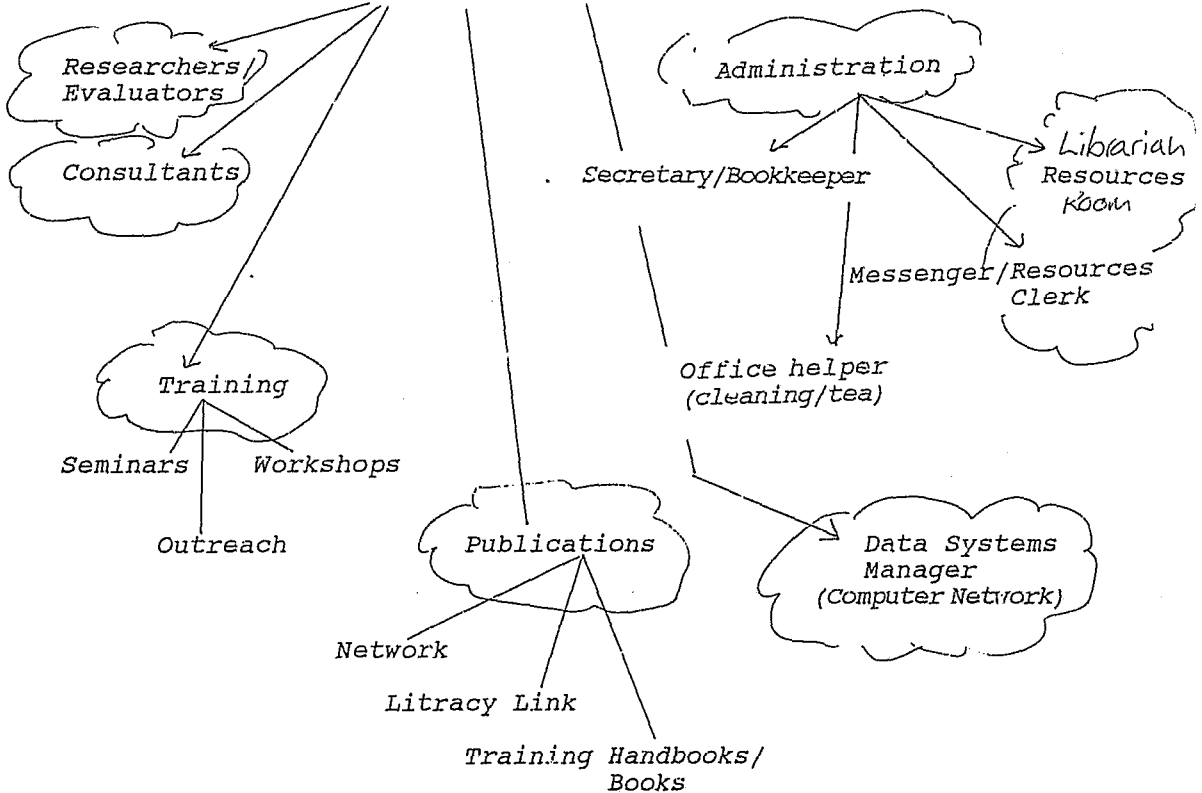

OF THE FORUM FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF ADULT EDUCATION**

1 INTRODUCTION

This report covers the period November 1991 to end March 1993 - a fifteen month period. The year end has changed from October to March.

1992 has been a period of growth for the FORUM. Our mailing list is now approaching 1000, in July of 1992 we inaugurated our new training venue on the 4th floor of Sable Centre, our staff complement has increased and the demand for our services, both referral, advice and training, has grown greatly.

2 ACTIVITIES

2.1 SEMINARS

Seminars were held monthly with the exception of the months near the Christmas period. The following seminars were held during the period under review :

Participants at FAAE training workshops are awarded a certificate of attendance if they attend all the modules.

In 1993 a full programme of workshops had been introduced (programme attached).

We have tried to schedule some workshops on Saturdays and some during the week to accommodate different requirements. Feedback from participants at workshops has shown that the topics have been useful, educative, with relevant theoretical and practical aspects. It seems that weekday workshops are more sought after.

2.3 OUTREACH

2.3.1 PHALABORWA WORKSHOP

The Phalaborwa Foundation has built two educational resource centres which the co-ordinators felt could be more widely used by the community. At their request the FAAE initiated contact with the co-ordinators. Two staff members together with three members of the FAAE were invited to assist in a workshop to investigate "Considerations in establishing a Community Resource Centre" held at Phalaborwa on 24, 25 September 1992. The workshop was well attended by community workers, co-ordinators, educators, members of local sports clubs, librarians, local ANC representatives and Foundation staff. Participation was enthusiastic and a very positive response followed.

In November another workshop followed where a SWOT analysis was done and this led to identifying an "Action Plan". Attendance increased from 23 to 35 with more women participants. The participants were left with a sense of purpose and were very enthusiastic. They were left with a plan of action and were very satisfied.

The community now needs to take the process further on its own with relevant support and advice where needed as the role of the FAAE is facilitative. Contact will be maintained with the Foundation.

2.3.2 EAST RAND TEACHERS ADULT EDUCATION METHODOLOGY WORKSHOP

In a needs analysis conducted during the latter part of 1992, teachers from adult education centres in the East Rand area expressed a need to continue with training in adult education methodology. A workshop was arranged for 22 teachers in February 1993 and held in the FAAE training venue. The teachers were very enthusiastic about the stimulation that the workshop would have on their work.

2.4 DETAILS OF JOINT SEMINARS / WORKSHOPS

On 27 October 1992 the FAAE, jointly with IPM, Eskom and Zenex Adult Literacy Unit, hosted a seminar entitled "EMPOWERING THE ABE PRACTITIONER". The workshop was planned as a day in which professionals could get together to examine their current situation critically and creatively. This workshop was very well attended by a wide spectrum of ABE practitioners, not only from NGO's and industry, but including participants from the Government Education Departments and the SADF with attendees from the OFS as well as the Transvaal.

Ed French (Zenex) outlined current developments in the field, Mastin Finsloo (UCT Department of Adult Education) reported on the National Education Policy Investigation and John Aitchison (Centre for Adult Education, University of Natal, Pietermaritzburg) addressed the issue - "Adult Education - Will the circus get its act together?" The afternoon was devoted to group work.

The ABE initiative was taken further with an **ADULT BASIC EDUCATION WORKSHOP**, jointly arranged by the Johannesburg City Council, FAAE, IPM and IMP, held at Mark's Park on 24 & 25 February 1993. The aim of this workshop was to review existing strategies in ABE, to examine new developments and to provide some skills and strategies for practitioners.

Dee Roup and Tracy Blues, FAAE co-ordinator and NETWORK co-editor respectively, addressed the topic of Creative Learning Methodologies. Other topics included Union perspectives, numeracy, evaluation of materials, cognitive skills, libraries, assessment of trainability, line management involvement and new developments in ABE. Response to this workshop was most encouraging, in fact extra accommodation had to be provided at the last minute very positive comments were made to the organisers.

Reports from these two joint seminars are available from the FAAE.

2.5 REFERRALS / NETWORKING

2.5.2 FAAE SUPPORT FOR THE COMMUNITY COLLEGES INITIATIVE:

Jan - Mar 1993

The FAAE has been actively engaged in supporting the National Community Colleges Initiative via Silas Zuma, National Coordinator. The aim is to enable a grass-roots, community-based perspective to be built into the consultation process.

A Committee for Community Based Adult Education was established (at a meeting at St Anthonys on the 14th January 1993) to facilitate this process, under the chairmanship of Motsumi Makhene of Funda Centre. Sister Magdeline Green of St Anthonys and Pule Makae of the University of the Orange Free State Need Programme, are this Committee's representatives on the National Steering Committee, together with Motsumi Makhene.

Regional Consultations and Representative Committees are being catalysed with the support of Dee Roup. One regional meeting was held at the Peninsula Technikon in the Western Cape on the 1st March 1993. A Transvaal Regional Meeting is planned for 3rd April at the FAAE and a Natal Meeting for end April.

2.5.3 FAAE SUPPORT FOR THE IEB:

Jan 1993

Dee Roup has had discussions with Melisa King of the IEB and attended the IEB planning workshop on January 28th 1993. The focus at this meeting was "Setting up an Adult Basic Examination System". Being aware of the importance of the accreditation and assessment factors, the FAAE has arranged an afternoon seminar on Tuesday 25th May to look at these issues.

2.5.1 CONSULTATIVE WORKSHOP ON DISTANCE LEARNING FOR SAIDE:

Nov 1992

Arranged by and held at the FAAE on 25 November 1992, the purpose of the gathering was for those present to share their knowledge and experience of ABE in the context of distance education in South Africa for Dr Solomon Inquai. Dr Inquai was in South Africa as a consultant to the South African Institute for Distance Education (SAIDE) to report on the suitability of distance education for ABE. It was agreed that all participants had benefitted from the exchange of views and contacts made.

2.5.4 THE RAINBOW PROJECT:

Jan 1992

The FAAE initiated a consultation process in October 1992 between Intervision (Mr Mike Daffy) and FASTER (Mr Fanyana Mazibuko) to look at the use of video for improving science teaching. Mr Daffy was exploring an idea for a project to use two or three shipping containers welded together to produce instant Community Centres, to be used for meetings, educational purposes (perhaps using video or computers) and for other Community purposes. Out of this preliminary discussion, the Rainbow Project was born. There now seems to be a dilemma as to who owns that Community Centre. We can only hope this hiccough does not bring the project to a halt.

2.5.5 FAAE SUPPORT FOR LAWYERS FOR HUMAN RIGHTS:

Oct 1992

In October 1992, the FAAE facilitated a meeting between four individuals, all of whom were pursuing the development of training for Lawyers for Human Rights. This led to a budding Network in this important specialty area.

2.5.6 FAAE HOSTING OF A DONORS MEETING ON "ABE FUNDING POLICIES"

Oct 1992

Ed French (ZENEX) and Dee Roup (FAAE) co-hosted a meeting for Donors and Networking agencies on the 26th October 1992. The aim was to share ideas and inform one another as to priorities and problems in the funding of ABE initiatives. The outcome was a clearer understanding of the different perspectives.

Amongst the very interesting points made, perhaps the most significant were as follows:

- * A need for exchange of ideas and networking amongst funders and recipients
- * A need for effective evaluation procedures
- * Guidelines for funding proposals (lists of priorities)
- * A more careful distribution of funding to large NGOs and small NGOs
- * More effective accountability procedures for NGOs
- * A more careful composition of Funding Boards
- * Job insecurity/lack of competitive salary packages in NGOs
- * NGOs need to network effectively with less fragmentation, to counterbalance pressure from donors or future pressure from the State

Some participants have made suggestions for a follow-up procedure:

- * Co-ordination of funding agencies about statements of criteria/priorities, etc
- * A follow-up meeting

2.5.7 FAAE SUPPORT FOR A RESEARCH INITIATIVE BY
DR JEFF WOLFSON:

Sept 1992

In September 1992, the FAAE was approached by Dr Jeff Wolfson for assistance in making contact with Community Based Initiatives that might be suitable to house a prototype pilot project that looks at using Technology for the teaching of Maths, Science, English, Biology and Accounting. Two consultative meetings were set up with a variety of well known individuals in Community Projects and as a result the Duduza Resource Centre was chosen to set up this prototype under the guidance of Mr Kennedy Skosana. It is hoped that more of these Projects will be established.

2.6 EVALUATION

The IDT Finance Corporation requested the services of the FAAE for an evaluation of their training course for loan officers in February 1993. Khanya Mazibuko and Ione Burke have undertaken the evaluation. PACT has also sought the FAAE's support in an upcoming evaluation. This seems to be a developing need.

2.7 RESEARCH

2.7.1 NEPI RESEARCH

In January 1992 the FAAE was asked by NEPI to be part of its research process into adult education and training. The FAAE was to research the state of adult education and training in industry, government and the community in the PWV area. This was not an in depth study as the time allowed was 2 months. The data collected was incorporated into the national report.

2.7.2 SKILLS DIRECTORY OF ADULT EDUCATION

In response to a request and funding from USAID, the FAAE is compiling a directory of skills in adult education in South Africa. To be published in May, the directory will have data concerning both individuals and organisations over the widest possible constituency of adult education. The data includes details of current and past involvement in adult education in the case of individuals, and the aims, main activities and resources of organisations.

Collection of the data has proved difficult but continual updating will be a priority. The data will be stored on computer in an accessible form to aid referrals and queries. The directory will be available at a nominal charge and will be published periodically.

2.8 THE NETWORK MAGAZINE

Through the dedicated hard work of co-editors, Ione Burke and Tracy Blues, in 1992 the NETWORK changed its format from a computer generated newsletter to a professionally published magazine on quality paper with colour on the outside cover and centre spread.

An indication of the favourable impression that the NETWORK has created was the request to send copies to 17 provincial libraries in the PWV and to overseas organisations. The magazine has proved a very effective public relations tool for the FORUM. When we have distributed it at seminars, conferences etc, we have had increases in the membership of the FAAE and requests to publish items or to use FAAE facilities.

The magazine is now a quarterly, (finance permitting), and features reports on all seminars held by the FAAE as well as adult education events, profiles, book reviews etc.

There have been four issues to date. Funding has proved a problem as sponsors do not seem to see funding of NETWORK as fitting in with their priorities. Yet as a networking tool the magazine has been invaluable. Networking was the FORUM'S original objective.

3 FUNDING

Initially the FAAE was self funded by a small donation per member at each seminar and an annual fee. This practice is still continued but a major fundraising effort is needed to make it possible for the FORUM to offer all the services which fulfil its role as a networking organisation promoting effective and professional adult education for change in South Africa.

In the recessionary conditions pertaining in South Africa in 1992\93 funding has become a problem for all NGO's in whatever field they operate. We are very grateful to those funders that continue to support us.

4 STAFF

At the close of 1991 the FAAE staff was a part- time team of two. We are now an enthusiastic and dedicated group of five permanent employees with consultants doing work for the FORUM on a regular basis.

5 FUTURE PLANS

5.1 NATIONAL ADULT EDUCATION COMPUTER INFORMATION NETWORK

A key function of the FAAE is to provide information about adult education activities, programmes, publications, resources etc. To enable us to access and provide this data more effectively the FAAE, together with other interested organisations, is exploring the feasibility of setting up a NATIONAL ADULT EDUCATION COMPUTERISED INFORMATION NETWORK.

In 1992 and in February of this year, Dee Roup, the FAAE co-ordinator, held discussions with organisations interested in computer networking and received support to continue the process.

It is suggested that instead of each adult education facility, whether NGO or University based, maintaining its own data base, and in many cases duplicating the work of others there would be a national co-operative initiative to manage and maintain,

computer-housed data bases. The proposal envisages providing central adult education organisations with software packages to enable them to manage and access the information they require. These ceninformation required by other diverse adult education initiatives. In this way anyone could have access to the data whether by computer modem, fax, telephone or mail, including individuals who do not have a computer. The aim is to be inclusive and provide ready access to information to empower the adult education process nationally and also to provide a cost effective solution to providing common information services, supporting a broad section of adult education and making it widely accessible.

The project will take account of the developments within the NGO network arena, will liaise with SANGONET and WORKNET (network service providers to the NGO community), EDUSOURCE, PRODDER and OLSET and will consult widely to discover what adult education organisations' information needs are. Flexibility will allow the project to adapt to changing needs.

5.2 LITERACY LINK

As a response to a plea from ABE and literacy practitioners to share ideas, expertise and resources, the FAAE has planned a literacy publication, *The Literacy Link*, to compliment our NETWORK magazine. The aim is to reach out to grassroots teachers and learners, providing accessible advice and information.

Proposed content will include literacy news both local and international, comments, articles, stories from learners, teachers, unions, writers etc., book reviews, in fact anything that could inform the practitioners.

Support for the project has been indicated from many credible literacy organisations. Funding proposals have been submitted to funders supportive of ABE projects.

5.3 WORKSHOP BOOKS

There are many FAAE members and others who are unable to attend our workshops for reasons of distance, time and finance. We plan to develop a workbook on the topic of each series of workshops for self-study and training purposes. The workbook from the Basic Evaluation Course, held in Feb/March 1993 is already in process.

5.4 RESOURCE BOX

The FAAE plans to develop a Resource Box of relevant information pertaining to adult education which can be made available to local organisations and those far away. This resource box will service a variety of training needs for adult education projects in various Communities.

5.5 OUTREACH

The FAAE would like to do more in the way of Outreach support and to extend the field trips undertaken to date. We plan to offer workshops that were held in JOHANNESBURG to other regions, both rural and urban. We also aim for our magazines and publications to enhance access to information to all regions. The training workbooks planned will also play a part here. Seminars held in Johannesburg are taped and recordings are available from the FAAE. Write-ups appear in the NETWORK.

6 CONCLUSION

The growth in the FAAE has been very satisfying and encourages a vision for the future of a national body of adult educators in South Africa who are professionally trained and will be prepared to contribute meaningfully towards the development process. The field of adult education should be more recognised and be firmly placed on the agenda in future discussions towards a national education policy.

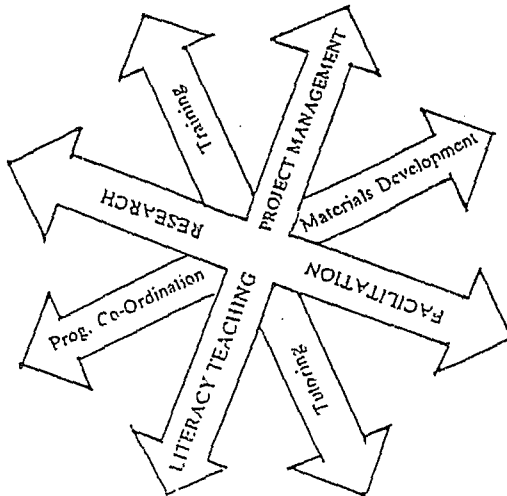

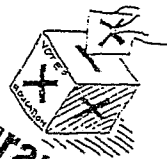

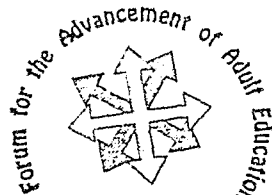
