1	<u>ABSTRACT, ToC:</u> - The abstract serves its purpose and provides a clear indication of the research endeavour. It could be improved by stating exactly what is meant by "the professional team" – at first, this could mean anything to the reader. - Actually it is a list of acronyms, not abbreviations. - ToC is fine.	- The sentence: "Most construction project teams comprise participants from different professions that combine to form temporary organisations aimed at achieving the common objective of delivering a project" was added to the abstract. - This was changed to a list of acronyms. - The candidate has noted this positive feedback from the examiner.
2	<u>INTRODUCTION, STRUCTURING AND RESEARCH QUESTIONS; LIT. REVIEW (LR) / CONCEPTUAL FRAMEWORK (CF) / METHODS</u> - This is well tackled. - On occasion in the RR, there are instances where some conceptual leaps are made and too much is assumed in terms of the reader's understanding of concepts, ideas or practices. - The background to the research and the research questions are generally well explained, set out and contextualized. - The methods (not methodology) section is very well handled and the 'research onion' is well used as a structuring and explanatory 'device.' - Perhaps S3.5 should explicitly mention that a literature review was conducted. S3.7.: how was the list of respondents identified in the first place?	- The candidate has noted this positive feedback from the examiner. - The candidate edited the document to improve the "readability" between paragraphs. - The candidate has noted this positive feedback from the examiner. - S3.: This section was changed to methods. S3.7.: explains how the list was identified. - S3.8.: Discusses central tendency. - As far as the candidate has been advised, the school does not explicitly require CF. - S2.6.: An example of an online BIM collaboration tool is the 'Horizontal Glue' programme - The candidate has noted this feedback from the examiner.

	• There could be slightly more discussion on central tendency in this ch. • There is no explicit CF – is it required in this School? • Elaboration of concepts or ideas or statements is sometimes required (indicated). Just one example is on p. 23. – the “horizontal glue” sentence seems to stop mid-sentence. Whilst one can <i>intuit</i> what is meant by this, one needs to be sure of the exact meaning of, and also the ramifications of what is meant here, especially <i>in terms of this RR</i>. • This is a well – structured review of the literature, which successfully draws together various strands of the literature. The LR could perhaps be a bit deeper and more critical though.	
3	<u>RIGOUR AND EDITING (as above, see hardcopy for details-examples below are merely indicative)</u> • The RR is generally well edited, but there are occasional comma, plural and minor grammar problems. • Periods are sometimes missing. • Problems with apostrophes, e.g., p.3 (it's) • Some typos. (indicated in text). • Et al. is sometimes incorrect, as et al • Words sometimes missing. • Wrong word used, e.g., p. 27 <i>deduce</i>, not <i>deduct</i>. • Style is sometimes a bit colloquial e.g., p. 36, and elsewhere.	• The candidate has noted this feedback from the examiner and sent the document for professional editing. • Periods were corrected. • Deduct was changed to deduce. • The candidate revised S3.9.
4	<u>FINDINGS/ SYNTHESIS AND CONCLUSIONS</u> • The findings and conclusions are generally well thought out and very well presented. Good use is made of the survey material and it is well dissected. • There are some vague statements, e.g., p.40” ‘most” developers; p.41: the “majority” of respondents... (be specific, especially when it comes to findings). • Similarly on p.51, does the ‘lowest level’ refer to the mean or the median? (They appear to yield different rankings). And	• The candidate has noted this positive feedback from the examiner. • S4. was revised to be more specific. • The document does not have a S5,7,2.

	what exactly is meant by “legislative”? (Presumably this encompasses only “regulation” and the “contractual”, but one needs to be certain). • S5,7,2 could be elaborated upon.	
5	<u>REFERENCING AND REFERENCE LIST; PRESENTATION; ANNEXURES.</u> • The RR is well presented. • The questionnaires are useful. • The referencing in the text and in the reference list is generally good and accurate. Some slips though, e.g., p.28 (indicated).	• The candidate has noted this feedback from the examiner and sent the document for professional editing.
6	<u>OVERALL COMMENTS AND EVALUATION</u> • This is a generally thorough and well – argued piece of work. • There are some minor editorial shortcomings, but generally the editing is good. • The writing style, structure and expression of ideas is all clear. • The mark could have been even better with a bit more depth and critique and elaboration of ideas, findings and recommendations. • Nevertheless, this is an interesting and relevant RR and it certainly adds to our theoretical and practical knowledge base.	• The candidate has noted this feedback from the examiner and sent the document for professional editing.
