

**MILITARIZING POLITICS OR POLITICIZING THE MILITARY? INTERACTIONS
BETWEEN POLITICIANS AND THE MILITARY IN ZIMBABWE, 2000-2013**

Abstract

The thesis analyses civil-military relations in Zimbabwe since independence, but especially during the period from 2000 through 2013. A central question is why an outright military coup has not occurred, despite severe political and economic crises. The question is broken down into two linked sub-questions: (1) the “classic” civil-military relations question of why the military have not seized power from civilians and (2) the question why no “populist military revolt” has occurred, despite the kind of hyperinflation that has triggered such revolts in countries like Ghana and Ethiopia. The analytical framework relates these questions to two “nested games”: (1) between the military elite and the civilian political elite, and (2) between the military elite and the military rank and file. On the first question, I argue that a degree of “fusion” between military and civilian political elites has helped to pre-empt a conventional military coup, with a partial politicisation of the military and a partial militarisation of civilian politics. On the second question, I argue that the civilian leadership has used a combination of nationalist/liberation ideology, material incentives, and the threat of violence, to maintain cohesion between the military leadership and rank and file soldiers.
