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APPENDIX 7 - QUESTIONNAIRE (ENGLISH VERSION) HANDED-OVER IN

ANGOLA:

QUESTIONNAIRE FOR MA THESIS THEME: “THE NATIONAL LIST OF PROPORTIONAL REPRESENTATION (PR) ELECTORAL SYSTEM APPLIED IN ANGOLA AND MOZAMBIQUE AND ITS POLITICAL IMPACT UPON EMERGING DEMOCRACIES’

One of the characteristic features of the Proportional System is that each party must present a list of candidates to the electorate. In other words, each party prepares and manages the party list with the names of its candidates to the National Assembly. The voters cast their votes to their party. And the parties are allocated their seats in the National Assembly in proportion to the general votes obtained across the national territory.

The winning candidates are considered to be those who have been placed in numerical or alphabetical order from their respective lists. Hence, the candidates who are likely to be elected are those whose position order is as nearer as to the top of their party lists.

The proportional system is also known by its inclusiveness nature namely on the representation of minority parties. And for countries such as Angola and Mozambique, **PR** tends to create sustainable steps towards a true process of pacification and democratisation.

- a. How can be characterised in general the first electoral process held in Angola in 1992, under the national list of Proportional Representation electoral system after 17 years of armed conflict?
- b. What difficulties were encountered or faced for the 1991 Bicesse Accords to be effectively and efficiently applied, namely with regard to the assembly, demobilisation, disarmament of troops and their social reinsertion?
- c. How did people face the role of the Electoral National Commission, in terms of organisation of the first ever general elections in Angola, with regard to the voting registration, programme of the civic education of the citizens for voting, electoral campaign and the counting of the electoral results?

- d. What was the meaning of the first multiparty elections held in Angola in 1992?
- e. In your understanding, did the voting process reflect the free choice of the voter? To what extent did the process of voting contribute to the mechanism of conflict management in Angola?
- f. Furthermore, in your understanding, did the voter make an intentional choice, that is, independent choice, or the voter cast his or her vote under pressure being influenced by his or her ignorance, illiteracy or fear?
- g. Could it be said that the voting process in Angola was influenced by ethnic factors?
- h. What legal instruments and institutions were in place prior and during the electoral campaign that may have facilitated the emergency of the other minority political parties for their participation into the national electoral process?
- i. In a comparative study of the elections outcomes in Angola and Mozambique, some academic theorists specialised on the elections such as Lijphart and Reynolds indicated that those two Lusophone countries had two different outcomes. Angola faced a post-electoral crisis and Mozambique had a peaceful transition, in spite of the fact that those two countries had chosen the same **PR** electoral system choice. In this context, what comparisons can be drawn from the experiences of Angola and Mozambique, within the ambit of their respective electoral processes, vis-à-vis, democracy and the construction of the democratic and law-abiding state?

QUESTIONNAIRE FOR MA THESIS THEME: “THE NATIONAL LIST OF PROPORTIONAL REPRESENTATION (PR) ELECTORAL SYSTEM APPLIED IN ANGOLA AND MOZAMBIQUE AND ITS POLITICAL IMPACT UPON EMERGING DEMOCRACIES’

One of the characteristic features of the Proportional System is that each party must present a list of candidates to the electorate. In other words, each party prepares and manages the party list with the names of its candidates to the National Assembly. The voters cast their votes to their party. And the parties are allocated their seats in the National Assembly in proportion to the general votes obtained across the national territory.

The winning candidates are considered to be those who have been placed in numerical or alphabetical order from their respective lists. Hence, the candidates who are likely to be elected are those whose position order is as nearer as to the top of their party lists.

The proportional system is also known by its inclusiveness nature namely on the representation of minority parties. And for countries such as Angola and Mozambique, **PR** tends to create sustainable steps towards a true process of pacification and democratisation.

- a. How can be characterised in general the first electoral process held in Mozambique in 1994, under the national list of Proportional Representation after 17 years of armed conflict?
- b. What difficulties were encountered or faced for the 1992 Roma Peace Accords to be effectively and efficiently applied, namely with regard to the assembly, demobilisation, disarmament of troops and their social reinsertion?
- c. How did people face the role of the Electoral National Commission, in terms of organisation of the first ever general elections in Mozambique, with regard to the voting registration, programme of the civic education of the citizens for voting, electoral campaign and the counting of the electoral results?
- d. What was the meaning of the first multiparty elections held in Mozambique in 1994?

- e. In your understanding, did the voting process reflect the free choice of the voter? To what extent did the process of voting contribute to the mechanism of conflict management in Mozambique?
