Transforming Evaluation for Equity and Social Justice

22-24 NOVEMBER 2022

The Centre for Learning on Evaluation and Results Anglophone Africa – CLEAR-AA - is hosting the second edition of its bi-annual Africa Evaluation Indaba between 22 - 24 November 2022. The Indaba is a 3-day event that comprises of live webinar panels, presentations and discussions around Transformation. It will comprise of six 90-minute-long webinar sessions spread across 3 days. The theme for the second edition is: 'Transforming Evaluation for equity and social justice.' Transformation has been a key feature in the international evaluation discourse and has been pursued and defined in varying ways. The lack of literature from the Global South makes the discourse around transformation more complex as it is often dominated by Global North ideas of what ought to be transformed. The Indaba aims to gather local and international speakers in contributing to the transformation discourse form a Global South perspective. It aims to explore transformation in Evaluation from its historical context in relation to the Global South and how it may relate to equity and social justice.
