01

The Extended Research Lifecycle

The research process does not conclude with publication; online dissemination and the establishment of a robust digital identity are critical for achieving real-world impact and influence.

Democratizing Access

Open platforms and institutional repositories democratise access to knowledge, significantly shortening the time from discovery to practical application and policy influence. Wits Libraries play a pivotal role in enabling discovery, preservation, and reuse of scholarly outputs.

Institutional Infrastructure

01

Core Services and Platforms

The ecosystem includes the institutional repository, open access journals, and research data services, all customised to support Wits researchers. Key researcher identifiers include ORCID, institutional profiles, and CRIS systems.

02

Support for Open Science

Comprehensive support is provided for open science practices, copyright management, and licensing, ensuring researchers can navigate the open scholarship landscape effectively.

Open Science and Citation Gains



The Citation Advantage



01 Evidence from Research

Open access, open data, and open code are consistently associated with increased citations and greater media attention. Numerous studies confirm an "open citation advantage" across various academic disciplines.



02 Early Visibility through repositories

Institutional repositories allow researchers to achieve earlier visibility and enable the reuse of their work, accelerating the dissemination and application of new findings.

Social Media, Altmetrics, and Scholarly Communication



Expanding the Metrics Landscape

01

New Forms of Dissemination

Social media platforms increase visibility and enable new forms of dissemination and networking, extending the reach of scholarly work beyond traditional academic circles.

02

Capturing Broader Engagement

Altmetrics capture attention in news, policy discussions, blogs, and Twitter/X, providing a more comprehensive view of impact beyond traditional citation counts. Tools like Altmetric, PlumX, and Mendeley readership offer valuable insights.

Key Platforms for Researchers

01

Essential Digital Profiles

Researchers should establish and maintain profiles on key platforms, including ORCID, Google Scholar, ResearchGate, Academia, Scopus Author ID, ResearcherID, and Mendeley, etc... to ensure consistent online presence.

02

Training and Improvement Targets

Training academics to create and maintain these profiles significantly improves online visibility. For Wits, it is valuable to show the percentage of researchers with ORCID and repository deposits, along with improvement targets.

Research Metrics: Beyond Citations and H-Index



Traditional and Evolving Metrics



Core Traditional Metrics

Traditional metrics include citation counts, journal impact factor, and the h-index, which are increasingly used for individual evaluation, rankings, and funding decisions.



Contextualising Metrics

There is a need to contextualise metrics within disciplinary norms and incorporate qualitative assessment, as researchers often have mixed feelings about their use in evaluation.

Altmetrics and Responsible Use

Methodological Considerations

Limitations and Uneven Application

Altmetrics reflect online engagement but can be methodologically limited and unevenly distributed across different academic fields, requiring careful interpretation.

Embedding in Communication Systems

Metrics are embedded in wider communication systems and can shift focus towards individual performance. Emphasizing principles like DORA and responsible metrics is crucial for Wits research-related policies.

Structuring Real-World Impact



Increasing Use in Evaluation

Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) are increasingly used to frame and evaluate the real-world impact of research, with proposals to use SDG targets as a structured impact framework for institutions.

Growth and Uneven Distribution

SDG-related research has grown rapidly but remains uneven across different goals and topics, presenting both opportunities and challenges for institutions like Wits.

Trend Analysis

Show the share of outputs mapped to each SDG through THE Impact Rankings or internal mapping, and illustrate collaboration networks with African, Global South, and global partners.

Health Sciences Success Story

Wits Health Sciences strategically managed research to double publications and increase citations significantly over the period 2008–2016, demonstrating effective capacity building.



Lessons for Scaling

Structured support through training, mentorship, and systems shortened time to graduation and strengthened capacity. These lessons can be scaled across the university and aligned with SDGs.

Practical Strategies for Researchers



Actionable Steps for Visibility



Publishing and Depositing

Publish open access or deposit accepted manuscripts in the institutional repository to ensure broad accessibility and compliance with funder mandates.



Digital Identity Management

Register ORCID and maintain a consistent author identity across all platforms to enhance discoverability and recognition.



Data and Code Sharing

Share datasets and code where possible, using DOIs and clear licenses to promote reuse and transparency.



Ethical Social Media Engagement

Engage ethically with social media to highlight new work and its societal relevance, extending the reach and impact of research.

Risks, Equity, and Critical Perspectives



Potential Pitfalls and Considerations

01

Over-Reliance on Metrics

Over-reliance on metrics can coerce behaviour and narrow definitions of "impact," potentially undermining the quality and diversity of research.

02

Equity in Open Science

Open science benefits can bypass researchers without connectivity, skills, or infrastructure, highlighting the need for equitable access and support.

03

Wits Libraries' Advocacy Role

Wits Libraries play a crucial role in capacity building, advocating for fair assessment, and supporting under-resourced scholars to ensure inclusive participation.

Comprehensive Support Services

Infrastructure Provision

Provide essential infrastructure including the repository, OA publishing support, and data services to enable researchers to maximize their impact.

Training and Capacity Building

Offer training on digital identity, metrics literacy, SDG mapping, and open science skills to empower researchers with the necessary tools and knowledge.

Advisory and Compliance Support

Provide advisory services on responsible metrics, journal selection, and compliance with funder mandates to guide researchers effectively.

Coordinated institutional support combined with researcher engagement can significantly raise Wits' profile and SDG impact, creating a virtuous cycle of visibility and influence.

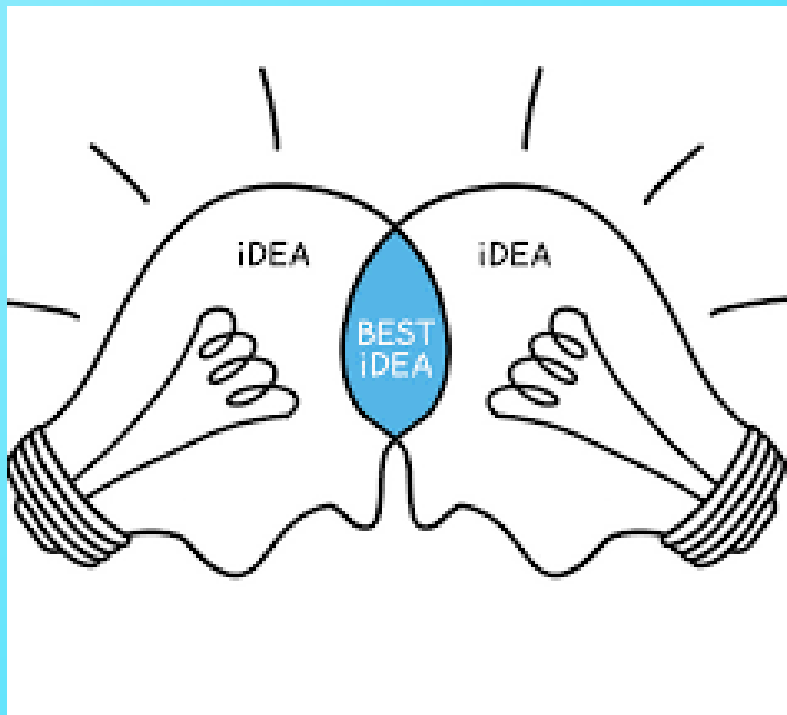
