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## EDITORIAL OPINION

The S.M.C.'s appointment of a sub-committee to constitute a more democratic Students' Council has been welcomed on all sides.

It would be well, however, to consider some of the problems this commission will have to face.

As we stated in our last editorial, the majority of Medicals did not participate in the managing of student affairs, partly because those responsible committees were run on a "jobs for pals" basis. Thus the elimination of this system of selecting committees should result not only in more students taking an active part in their affairs, but also in "the best men getting the jobs." If the latter were true it would mean that one-time financial wizards would be in charge of our economics; catering Kings (and Queens) would be running our Refectory, and retired newspaper men would be publishing our journals.

The advantage of such a scheme would be that we should be mustering the maximum "talent" and theoretically, at least, our many student enterprises would be run with the maximum efficiency. All this no doubt is particularly desirable, but in practice there are certain drawbacks. Very often it is not the financial wizards or catering Kings who are interested in student affairs, and an efficient man who is not interested in his job, will, in all probability, be no more successful than an amateur who is keen.

Although a number of our finest leaders have been mature individuals, many of our older men and women feel that they are here "to do Medicine," and not to expend time and energy on managing student affairs. So it is that some of our best workers are not available. Yet, even if we were able to place the

most experienced students in the various committees, we might then be denying interested amateurs an opportunity of learning how to run the affairs; for it is probable that each year another bank manager or catering King will come to light, and unqualified students might never be anything more than committee members.

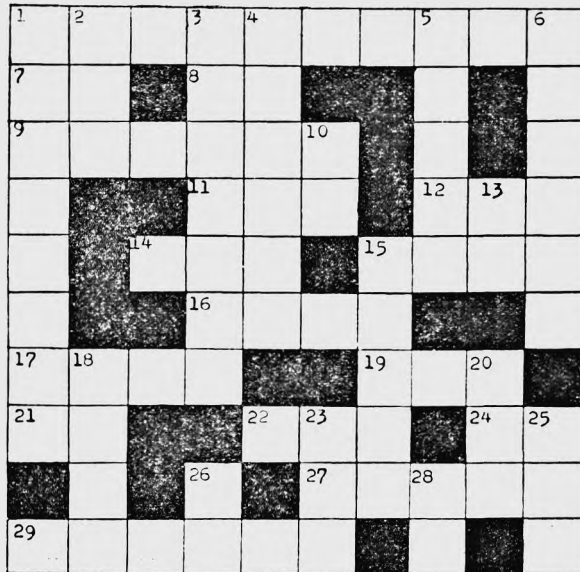
Then too, if this is to be a truly democratic organisation, all S.M.C. members, e.g. Chairman of Amenities, Supplies, etc. should be elected by the general student body, and the difficulty arises here, that it is not always the most efficient student who is the most popular.

Another snag concerning a completely elected S.M.C. is that this Council would then probably reach unwieldy proportions.

Up to date it has been the policy of our S.M.C. to designate to each of its elected repre-

representatives (e.g. the class reps and six S.R.C. members) some further post (e.g. Secretary or Treasurer of Council, Chairman of Refectory, etc.). This has been done for the purpose of keeping the Council as small and manageable as possible. If however the S.M.C. has to be entirely elected, it is more than likely that in their effort to distribute favours evenly, the student body will elect a different student to every available position, and in this way the S.M.C. will become an unwieldy body of representatives.

Thus, in considering the problem of a more democratic S.M.C. we have, on the one hand, to applaud the principle and to express every wish that a hundred per cent. elected S.M.C will come into being; whilst on the other hand we have to remember that our S.M.C. has always been an efficient working body, and that in our efforts to obtain a more democratic Council we must not sacrifice its efficiency.

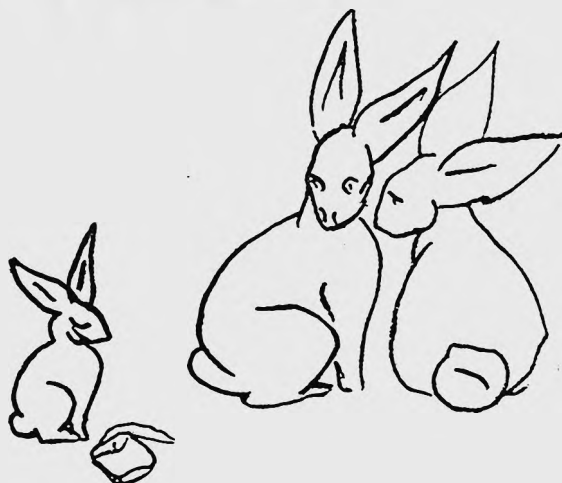

At a S.R.C. meeting held on April 6th, the following motion was passed:

That the S.M.C. be considered as a separate body as far as S.R.C. finances are concerned, receiving from the S.R.C. the difference between £2 10s. per student excluding 1st year Medical Students and the pro rata expenditure on the following items:

- (a) Developments Fund.
- (b) N.U.S.A.S.
- (c) Pavilion and Grounds.
- (d) Grant to Varsity for Grounds.
- (e) All Sports Council.
- (f) Local Tours for Sports teams.
- (g) Students Union Grant to All Sports Council.
- (h) Inter-Varsity expenses.
- (i) N.U.S.A.S. Conference.
- (j) Extended Tours.
- (k) Wu's Views.

Interviewed and asked for a statement Alec Gonski, President of the S.R.C. and final year Medical said: "After several attempts in previous years, the Medical School has achieved its financial Autonomy. The S.M.C. shall not from this year onward budget for a sum of money as grant from the S.R.C. but at the end of each year shall receive its pro rata share of all the S.R.C. money left over after the above items had been paid off. This will ensure that money received from Medical Students by the S.R.C. will not be spent on facilities from which Medical Students do not derive benefit.

Although the sum may not be perhaps far in excess of previous grants, the distribution shall be much fairer."

We may soon have our own barber shop in the Medical School and we are informed that investigations along these lines have already been instituted. The saving in time and money is one which will readily be accepted by all students and the project is yet another proof of the versatility of the S.M.C.

# INTERNAL

# AFFAIRS

As a result of representations made to him Mr. Raikes has agreed to remit the sum of ten shillings per medical student to the Students' Benefit Society. This Society has not catered for Medical Students in the past and this innovation means that every medical student will be entitled to an annual complete and thorough examination including such services as Chest X-rays, etc.

This development is one of great importance and we strongly urge all medicals to take advantage of it and to safeguard their health.

Full particulars are obtainable from the Chairman of the Students' Benefit Society, Milner Park, to whom all enquiries should be addressed.

"The recent Health Survey of Native children at Alexandra Township has clearly shown that Medical students of all races, creeds and colours have a lively and acute appreciation of health, social and economical problems in this country. About eighty students, mainly of the senior years, participated in this project, which lasted for one week (8-12 March, 1943). 3,510 African school children were examined. One hopes that this piece of work will be the forerunner of greater schemes for the future. Students can do the job, as has been clearly shown, provided they get leadership and support. This survey could not have been possible had it not been for the support both moral and financial, of Mr. Raikes and the University. This enthusiasm of the University augers well for the future of this and similar schemes. The report of the survey is in the press and will appear shortly. Those who participated in the survey will each receive a copy free of charge, while other copies will be obtainable from the Librarian, Medical School at 1s. 6d. each."

The above is an extract from an interview with Harding le Riche, organiser of the survey. We feel that this should be only a beginning and that the time is not too far distant when the health of the entire Fordsburg area will be cared for by Medical Students.

## Sporting Scene...

Despite the recent setbacks caused by the fees dispute, the Medical School All Sports Council has gone ahead organising sport for Medicals.

**Tennis.** — Inter-firm tennis has now begun. Everyone is striving hard to help relieve the tennis-ball shortage and will anyone who can further aid please get in touch with Mr. te Groen. The final is expected to be played next month.

**Table Tennis.** — Inter-year table tennis has started. The results up to date are as follows:

Second Years beat Sixth Years.

The final will be played at the end of this month. An innovation this year is the introduction of the inter-firm table tennis.

**Soccer.** — The Soccer Club was again beaten into submission by the University All Sports Council in a matter that has now become a yearly feud. The Soccer Club has long suffered the indignity of having to play on a field smaller than the standard minimum size and application was made to use the cricket field until such time as the soccer field was enlarged, but this motion was defeated. The Soccer Club is, however, taking the matter up with the Development Fund Committee and it is to be hoped that their efforts will meet with success.

**Hockey.** — Inter-year matches are being arranged and the Medical School Ambulance Unit is also to be approached for a match. Owing to the shortage of women hockey players, an attempt is being made to arrange mixed teams for the inter-year competition. This was done last year with considerable success.

**Baseball.** — The possibility of inaugurating a Baseball Club is being investigated. Will all students interested in taking an active part and all those possessing a working knowledge of the game please submit their names to the Chairman, All Sports Council, as soon as possible.

## THEY BRING LIGHT

The Occupational Therapy Society has this year widened its field of activity and in addition to teaching knitting in the wards, women patients are being taught to sew and are making the garments for the children who attend the Nursery school. Through the co-operation of the City Librarian, a library of approximately one thousand books in English, Afrikaans and the vernacular has been opened. Books are distributed to each ward in the N.E.H. once a week by both men and women students; this being the first time that men have officially taken part in Occupational Therapy activity. An attempt is being made in some wards to teach children of school-going age to read and write. All wards will shortly be equipped with wirelasses.

With money from Rag and from donations the new Nursery school is to be erected and it is hoped that a full time Non-European Nursery school teacher will be employed. The building will contain a washroom with small lavatories and wash-basins. This room will remain open to the children all day as there is no suitable lavatory accommodation for them in the ward at present. A toy-mending and carpentering section is being opened to be run in conjunction with the Nursery school.

The Society has several aims for the near future and these may be summarised as follows: (1) To provide educational facilities for children above nursery school age.

(2) To give simple talks and demonstrations on the public health aspects of personal hygiene, nutrition and sanitation — thereby explaining to patients who suffer from preventable diseases why they are ill and what to do in order to prevent their families from contracting the same diseases.

The women of Medical School have done some hard work this year. As its scope is increasing the Occupational Therapy Society can now offer its membership to any men who are interested and it is hoped that the Society will soon cease to be a predominantly female one.

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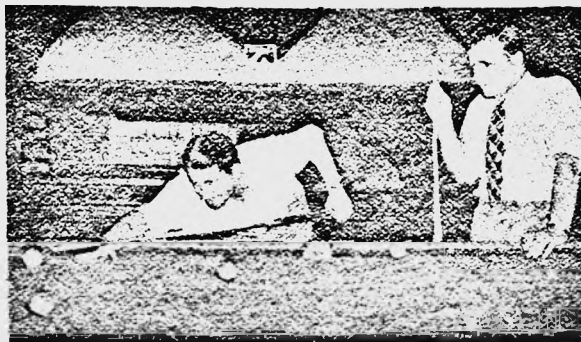
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
