How to Choose a Dictionary

The busy teacher has little time in which to choose between dictionaries by thorough testing. Here is a quick two-minute test which will tell you whether a dictionary is suitable for your school.

- 1 How many words has it? 15,000 is the minimum for children aged 12.
- 2 Does it miss out easy words? Look up do, bring, were, who.
- 3 Is it up-to-date? Look up air-hostess, central heating, nuclear energy.
- 4 Will it be useful for lesson notes? Look up mortise, bunsen burner, tropic, gramme.
- 5 Will it help with grammar? Does it give parts of speech; does it give the tenses of *bring*, and the plural of *lens*?
- 6 Does it give pronunciation? Look up café.
- 7 Does it give compound words? Look up level-crossing, self-sacrifice, third-rate

The ideal dictionary for pupils aged 11 to 15 years has about 21,000 words and will pass this test, or a longer one devised by yourself, with flying colours. 
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
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
