## 4. Interview Guide

### First Interview

Researcher-participant Introductions, followed by open-ended interview questions:

#### 1. How did you become a traditional healer?

- What type of healer are you?
- How long did your initiation training take to complete and could you describe the events that led up to you finding a teacher and becoming a student-healer?
- How has your life been influenced by completing your initiation as a traditional healer?
- How would you describe your roles within your family and the community in which you live?
- How would you describe yourself at the time you began your initiation? (or ended it)
- How would you describe your life at the time you were called to traditional healing and how would you say it is different now?

#### 2. How did you come to practice your current profession?

- Could you describe the events that led up to you working in your current job?
- How would you describe your daily life and work at present? (*How you go about a typical day, what you do?*)
- Could you tell me about your experiences (thoughts and feelings) at work when you started working in this field for the first time?
- How do you describe the differences and similarities between practising as a traditional healer and your current work?
- How does your chosen profession relate to your personal values and cultural understanding or background?
- How would you consider your experiences at work to be different from others who work with you?
- How would you describe the influence of traditional initiation on your experiences at work?
- How do you experience your current profession as a woman and how do you feel this is influenced by your training and initiation into traditional healing?
- What do you feel contributes mostly to your choice to follow a career other than full time practice of traditional healing.

#### 3. How do you experience living and working as a woman in South Africa at present?

- How would you describe the person you are now?
- As you look back on your experiences, are there any other events that stand out in your mind? Could you describe some of these and how they affected you?
- How do you understand your role as working professional and initiated traditional healer in the context of social transformation in South Africa?
- How do you view your role as a woman in the current South African context?
- Is there anything that occurred to you during this interview, which you had not thought of before?
- Is there anything you would like to ask me?

## 5. Interview Guide

### Second Interview

Researcher-participant Introductions, followed by open-ended interview questions:

#### 1. How did you come to practice your current profession? (*Reviewed focus*)

- Could you describe the events that led up to you working in your current job?
- Could you tell me a bit about your experiences (thoughts and feelings) at work when you started working in this field for the first time?
- How do you describe the differences and similarities between practicing as a traditional healer and your current work?
- What does your work show about your strengths and weaknesses?
- How would you describe the influence of traditional initiation on your work?
- What do you feel contributes mostly to your choice to follow a career other than full time practice of traditional healing?

#### 2. How do you experience working in your current profession?

- As you look back on your experiences of working in the hospital, are there any other events that stand out in your mind? Could you describe some of these and how they affected you?
- What is it like working as a traditional healer in a western profession?
- What about this work do you like the most?
- What about this work do you like the least?
- What about this work fits with being a traditional healer?
- What about this work does not fit with being a traditional healer?
- What do you think it would be like if you had never worked in a hospital?
- What about working in a hospital has been good for you?
- What do the other people you work with think of your traditional healing in the work?

#### 3. Closing questions for interview:

- Is there anything you would like to ask me?
