5. a) Did the counsellor help you to understand the symptoms you were experiencing?  
b) Did the counsellor reassure you that your reaction was normal in an abnormal event?  
(Normalizing and reassuring) Yes/No (Please elaborate if answered yes)
6. Did the counsellor acknowledge or affirm your thoughts, feelings and actions in the situation?  
(Reframing) Yes/No (Please elaborate if answered yes)
7. Were you better able to cope after the intervention?
